# Dean of Students

## **A student has been missing from my class this week. Whom should I call?**

In an effort to aid retention, calls should be placed to Nita Pearce, Assistant Registrar 731.661.5187. Nita Pearce then contacts Kimberly Thornbury, Vice President of Student Services & Dean of Students, and Bethany Morse, Director of the Hundley Center, who places a call and/or meets with the student. Absences often are indicators of problems that can be solved with pastoral, academic or psychological care. The professor will also receive an email follow-up each Friday (as needed) from Bethany Morse with helpful updates regarding the missing or struggling student.

Research consistently tells us that student absenteeism during the first four weeks of class is one of the top indicators for at-risk students. Union University Hundley Center research shows there is less than a 5% chance that low mid-term grades will improve by finals. Stated differently, by the time mid-term grades are posted, it is almost too late for significant grade intervention. Therefore, it is key for Union to be proactively involved in the outreach, assessment, and assistance of students who display early at-risk indicators.

## **Registration**

Every semester during finals week, the Dean of Students Office emails every faculty member and lets them know the names and contact information of their advisees who have not yet registered for the next term. In an effort to aid retention at Union, we ask that you contact this student and/or provide the Dean of Students Office with any information that might be helpful in order to help retain this student to our campus.

## **What is the cost of eating meals in Union's cafeteria?**

Union University Dining Services provides a Faculty/Staff meal card with 20 meals for \$87.80. This meal card is valid in the Student Dining Hall and the Lexington Inn (the Lex,) is non-transferable, and does not expire. This card can be purchased from Aramark, whose offices are located in the Student Dining Hall. A second option is to have Aramark place your 20 pre-paid meals on your Union ID card. ### **Emergency Text Notification**

#### **(Emergencies, Severe Weather Alerts, Cancelled or Delayed Classes)**

Union University provides an emergency notification system available to all students, faculty and staff and family members at [www.uu.edu/uualerts](http://www.uu.edu/uualerts).

This system is voluntary, but faculty and staff are STRONGLY encouraged to register at [www.uu.edu/uualerts](http://www.uu.edu/uualerts) to receive text messages on their cell phone to inform them in the event of a campus wide emergency, security and/or weather threat.

The system will be used with discretion and again, used only in the event of a high level emergency that would require the notification of the entire campus. Faculty may also choose to receive notices for specific campuses, (e.g. Jackson, Germantown, Olford Center) if campus-specific messages are warranted.

This text messaging program is a layer of security, and e-mail and the campus website will still be the most reliable source of information about current security related campus events.

Union also has an Info Dawg Line at 731.661.5048 that is updated with emergency information. The UU website is also a source for any emergency information or school closing/delay updates.

### **E-announcements/Digital Signs**

Union Community e-announcements are sent every Monday to all students, faculty, and staff. Parents who sign up on the Parent's Place page on our website can also receive them. ### **Recycling**

The Union Community participates in a campus-wide recycling program. Currently Union recycles office-type paper, newspapers, empty aluminum cans, plastics marked with #1 or #2 inside the “triangle” recycling symbol, and cardboard. Each faculty and staff has personal recycle bins in their office, but each office does need to take their recyclables to the large blue floor collection bins. Place all office paper and newspapers in the large blue paper recycling bins. For plastics, please remove caps off of bottles and jugs and then place the bottles along with the caps into the large blue recycling bins. Aluminum cans also go into the plastics recycling bins.

We can also accept your recycling from home. After separating the plastics and aluminum from the paper as outlined above, bring your recycling to Facilities Management where you’ll find a recycling shed.

## **Assistant Dean of Students / Chief Judicial Officer**

**One of my advisees recently received a letter about a values violation. Do I need to do anything?**

When a student’s behavior is inconsistent with Union’s five community values (worth of the individual, self-discipline, academic and personal integrity, respect for property and the environment and respect for community authority) the letter to the student is always copied to the advisor. No action by the advisor is needed; it is simply for informational purposes. If the advisor notices that the student is doing poorly in classes as well as making “not so wise” decisions outside the classroom, it may be a signal that the student needs

additional help and assistance. We have also found that letters to the advisor are another tool we use to help our students link belief and behavior during their University years.

## Assistant Dean of Students & Minority Student Support

**What support strategies are in place for the minority student population at Union?**

Jacqueline Taylor, Assistant Dean of Students, serves as a liaison to African American and minority students. Below are specific areas of expertise where the Assistant Dean of Students provides direct support to the minority student population:

## Career Services

**How can Career Services help my students get jobs?**

Located in the Penick Building on the west end just off the A-Hall, Career Services' purpose is to help students understand more clearly who God has made them to be and to assist them in discovering the opportunities in this world to live out their uniqueness.

In addition to regular Monday and Thursday workshops on résumé writing, interview skills, networking, salary negotiation, job fair strategies, and etiquette, three Career Fairs are planned each year. The 10-11 career fairs include Career "U"niversity, the Job Market and Teacher EXPO. We encourage faculty to encourage their students to attend these job fairs and professional development workshops. Full-time and part-time jobs are listed on the career services website at [www.uu.edu/student-services/careerservices](http://www.uu.edu/student-services/careerservices). Password = "empower".

Additionally, the career services staff is available to speak in classes on a variety of subjects related to career or graduate school planning. We also offer the "What Can I Do with a Major In....?" discipline-specific workshop series to help students understand the many career options available in

their chosen major. Finally, students can place their résumés on file in the online résumé database for employer review and consideration for internships and part-time/full-time jobs.

## **Counseling Services**

### **I think a student in my class needs professional help. Whom can I call?**

You can contact Dr. Paul Deschenes at 731.661.5322 or Ms. Tamarin Huelin at 731.661.5923 in Counseling Services for a consultation. Counseling Services is located between Student Life and Campus Ministries in the Student Union Building. If needed, they can refer a student to an off-campus professional. Please remember that when a faculty member counsels a student, they assume risk on behalf of the university. Therefore, please be sure to partner with our Counseling Services department on issues that require more specialized help (suicide, self mutilation, eating disorders, etc.)

### **I think a student has a learning disability. What should I do?**

Counseling Services offers a free initial consultation with the student to determine the likelihood of a learning disability. If a professional evaluation is needed, then the student is referred to a specialist for an extensive learning disability evaluation. The cost for the evaluation is \$200. Jane Betts, University Registrar, contacts the professors of students with special needs every semester so the professor is informed of any necessary accommodations (for example, extended time on tests.)

### **What else does Counseling Services provide?**

Counseling Services provides counseling for anxiety, depression, relationship problems, sleep problems, assertiveness, time management and more. There are screening tests on the counseling website for depression, anxiety, eating disorders and attention deficit.

Dr. Deschenes is also the Director of Disabilities Services. Students needing accommodations for a disability must register with his office and provide documentation of their disability.

## Health Services

### **Can I visit Health Services?**

Yes, faculty and staff may be seen in Health Services free of charge; however spouses and children are not eligible for services. Health Services also can provide small doses of over-the-counter medicine free of charge and certain lab tests such as strep and mono are only \$5.00. Flu shots are also given every fall for a minimal charge. Dr. Chris Lewis or Dr. Joe Ragon work in Health Services two hours every week, and nurse practitioners staff the clinic for six hours every week. The Health Clinic is open Monday – Friday 8:00-11:45 a.m. and 1:00-4:00 p.m., when classes are in session and can be reached at 731.661.5284.

## Hundley Center for Academic Enrichment

### **A student is struggling academically in class and needs help. What are my options?**

Besides assisting the student personally or connecting him or her with a stronger student in your class, you have two options. First, The Hundley Center for Academic Enrichment located on the second floor of the library provides free peer tutoring in over 15 disciplines. The Hundley Center is open Monday through Friday. A list of disciplines and tutor schedules can be obtained on Union's web page at [www.uu.edu/programs/hundleycenter](http://www.uu.edu/programs/hundleycenter). Also, appointments are made via the webpage or by calling the Hundley Center at 731.661.5123. Dr. Paul Deschenes (731.661.5322), Union's Director of Counseling Services, also assists students with study skills. Sherry Tignor (731.661.5037) serves as Director of Academic Success and works directly with conditionally admitted students (The Keystone Program.)

## **A student with a disability requires special testing accommodations. How do I set this up?**

If the student has provided documentation of their disability and is registered in the office of Counseling Services, then you may contact Rachel Marshall at 731.661.5123 to set up test proctoring. The Hundley Center provides for special testing accommodations, such as extended time on tests and testing in a distraction-free environment. Please contact the Hundley Center at least 1 week prior to the test date to allow for adequate time to schedule testing. ## **What resources are available to students wanting to pursue graduate school?**

The Hundley Center for Academic Enrichment has partnered with Kaplan to provide a graduate school test prep opportunity for Union students at a discounted rate. The Hundley Center also offers graduate school workshops covering the application process, writing a personal statement, and interviewing for graduate school. ## **Residence Life**

### **Is there guest housing available on Union's campus?**

Yes, there are 1 - 2 lower-cost guest suites available located on the second floor of McAfee Commons. ### **Describe Union's Residence Life.**

Because 91% of a student's time is spent OUTSIDE of the classroom, Union recognizes Residence Life as an integral part of the college education as well as a prime opportunity for students to integrate their faith, living, and learning.

Much time is spent providing Christ-centered, student-focused programs as well as an environment that cultivates the growth of each student. The Residence Life staff includes one Director of Residence Life, one Residence Life Secretary, three Residence Directors, three Assistant Residence Directors, Resident Staff Advisors, and Resident Advisors dedicated to serving students daily during these life-changing college years.

Union's Residence Life offers each student unique, apartment style housing with a private bedroom, internet access and a kitchen. In total, we offer housing for 1315 single students. For the safety and security of our students, curfew is 2:00 a.m. each night of the week. Open visitation is every weekend: Friday and Saturday, 2 - 10 p.m. and Sunday, Noon - 6:00 p.m.

The Bowld Commons in the Quads Residence Complex and McAfee Commons in the Heritage Residence Complex have spacious social areas, kitchens, laundry facilities (in McAfee) and vending. Students are encouraged to use these areas for group studying, hanging out, watching movies, and attending various residence life programs. The Commons are staffed by Resident Advisors to provide assistance to the residents and get to know them on a daily basis as they enjoy college life together here at Union.

The Bowld Commons also has three classrooms and three conference rooms as well as patios that can be reserved for meetings and gatherings. Visit [www.uu.edu/student-services/residencelife/reservations](http://www.uu.edu/student-services/residencelife/reservations).

## **How do I receive my parking sticker?**

All faculty members who drive a vehicle onto Union's campus must register that vehicle with the University. Parking stickers are free of charge, even if faculty members register more than one car. Please visit the Office of Safety and Security located next to the cafeteria for your parking permit. Starting August 2010, faculty/staff parking permits will be renewed every 4 years.

## **Oops, I received a parking ticket. What now?**

Parking tickets for faculty/staff are used as a warning notice only. Please call the Security Office at 731.661.5018, or stop by the Security Office with your parking ticket. There will be no charge for faculty/staff.

## **I'm taking my class on a field trip. Can I use a Union University van?**

# Student Leadership Development

## **What is SGA?**

The Student Government Association (SGA) is the chief legislative body of and for the student body. Students can become directly involved with SGA by running for an executive office, class office, class council, or being a member of the Freshman Council. Also, they can join one of the over 60 student

organizations on campus. From the Psychology Club to Greek life, students have a myriad of options for involvement, all of which send representatives to the Student Senate. The office of Student Leadership Development advises the SGA and serves as the main contact in coordinating all the student organizations on campus. Each club also has a faculty or staff advisor.

### **What leadership programs are offered?**

The office of Student Leadership Development offers a variety of leadership programs and training opportunities for students. Each semester, student leaders are given the opportunity to enhance their leadership ability through training workshops with university administration and national leadership speakers. Servant Leadership is also highly encouraged through participation in the annual Campus & Community: A Day of Remembrance & Service, as well as partnerships with various non-profit organizations in the community. The Office of Student Leadership Development serves as a resource and contact for student leaders, and both the Director and Assistant Director serve as advisors and mentors to students serving in student leadership positions.

### **Explain Greek Life at Union.**

Approximately 25% of our full-time undergraduates are members of Greek organizations. Union University is the only member institution within the Coalition of Christian Colleges and Universities (CCCU) to have a national Greek system.

We have six national social fraternal organizations. There are three for women: Zeta Tau Alpha, Kappa Delta, Chi Omega, and three for the men: Alpha Tau Omega, Lambda Chi Alpha, Sigma Alpha Epsilon. Each fall the Greeks host formal recruitment and during this time, interested students can learn more about Greek life. The Office of Student Leadership Development can also provide information on the Jackson Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha.

While most students participate in recruitment in their freshmen year, some students wait until their sophomore, junior or even senior year to join a Greek organization. Many students who are involved in a Greek organization are also very active on campus in leadership positions. Students who are Greek hold approximately one-half of campus leadership positions. Our Greeks are

committed to upholding Christian values and principles; many have weekly Bible study and prayer time together. In addition, each Greek organization is actively involved in community service, leadership development and mentorship.

## **Student Programs**

### **What is SAC?**

SAC stands for the Student Activities Council. SAC is made up of 25 students who enjoy planning and hosting campus-wide events such as Movie on the Lawn, Variety Show, Be Our Guest, and Carl Perkins Christmas Party. SAC recruits new members every September.

### **SAC's Purpose Statement:**

Believing that college is more than just the classroom experience, the Student Activities Council seeks to promote campus unity and improve the quality of student life by providing entertaining activities and various opportunities for campus involvement.

### **I love having students in my home. Can SAC help?**

Yes, SAC can help! Every spring a chair from the Student Activities Council coordinates a program called "Be Our Guest." This event allows faculty and staff the opportunity to invite students into their homes for a home-cooked meal and, more importantly, fellowship. Students love "Be Our Guest," because it allows them to see Union's faculty and staff outside of their work environment (it also gives them a break from Ramen noodles and Kraft Macaroni and Cheese).

During the month before Be Our Guest (usually March), faculty and staff will receive more information about hosting a group of students in their home.

## **Wellness Services**

### **Can I exercise right away?**

Wellness Services offers a wide variety of services and activities to the Union

Community. The Union Community refers to all faculty, staff, students, and their spouses and dependents. All Union Community participants must swipe their Union ID card when entering each facility. An orientation can be provided to students, faculty, and staff but it is not necessary. For more information, please call Matt Brunet at 731.661.5307.

**Can my spouse and children exercise, use the gym and pool?**

Spouses and dependents of Union's faculty, staff, and students are welcome to use the wellness center, aquatic center, and activities center. Children must be 13 years or older to use the facilities without parental supervision. Spouses and dependents must fill out a health history questionnaire and receive a Union ID card before using these facilities. For more information, please call Matt Brunet at 731.661.5307.

**I need to get in shape. Can Matt help me?**

Wellness Services offers numerous programs and incentives as well as fitness evaluations and certified personal training. For more information, please call Matt Brunet at 731.661.5307.

**My neighbor wants to exercise with me. Can they come to the Wellness Center?**

Outside guests may use the Wellness facilities. The first visit costs \$1; after that, they must purchase a membership in order to return. A release of liability must be signed before participating. Outside memberships are also offered to the surrounding community. Memberships are available for the Wellness Center, Aquatic Center and Activities Center. **My child wants to have a pool party. Can I rent the pool?**

Yes, the pool can be reserved for a fee of \$100-\$120. This fee includes a 2 hour time slot as well as one or two certified lifeguards. There is a 25-50 swimmer maximum. For more information, please call Matt Brunet at 731.661.5307.

**Can faculty join intramurals?**

All faculty, staff, students and their spouses are welcome to participate in the intramural program. Intramural season begins in September and will end in May,

with about 8-10 events each semester. The Union Community is encouraged to participate in the many intramurals that are offered such as flag football, softball, basketball, volleyball, ping pong, racquetball and more. 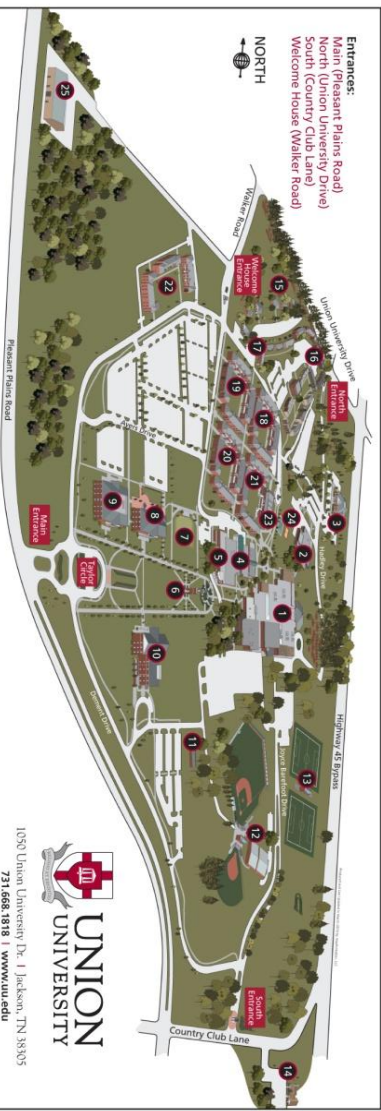
**I like walking for exercise. Is there a course I can use?**
